








BURNING MAN 2005

Imagine a place where strangers coax you into their homes to pamper you and shower you with gifts and treats. All they want in return is to bask in the joy of giving. Could this be a dream? Perhaps, but once a year for one week the collective dream of more than 40,000 people becomes reality in the unforgiving climate of Nevada's Black Rock Desert. Just two hours north of Reno, a utopian Mecca called Black Rock City rises like a phoenix from the talc-like ashes of a dry lake bed called playa. This surreal backdrop of flat, dusty earth and open skies is the site of Burning Man, which takes place the week before Labor day. What is Burning Man? Just imagine Mad Max meets Vegas, a neon-lit adult playground, a cutting edge art space and a stage for radical self-expression, where anything goes and nothing costs money.

urning Man rejects commerce and functions as a gift economy. The only things sold are coffee at the Center Camp Café and ice. While you can leave your wallet at home it's no cheap vacation. The average ticket price is \$250 and with camp dues, camping, traveling, and costume expenses it can














add up. But it's an experience money can't buy. People offer massage, Reiki sessions, bike repair, yoga classes, drinks, food, theater, tarot reading, beauty treatments and a bevy of classes for free. They pass out homemade gifts and trinkets on the streets. This is all done in the spirit of participation. Everyone offers something to the playa community. A week is simply not enough to experience all that is offered.


his environment is not for everyone. Low humidity, the punishing sun and day temperatures between 90 and 100 degrees F threaten to turn people into raisins. But it doesn't stop anyone from riding their bikes around the town (a collection of tents, domes and shade structures) to different theme camps and events. Nor does it keep the alcohol or recreational drugs at bay. Typical attire is short shorts and lingerie for women and skirts and sarongs for men. Many people wear nothing at all. At night the fishnets and fake furs come out as the temperature falls between 30 and 55 degrees F. The sleepy daytime heat gives way to fabulous light displays, bikes decorated with EL wire and parties that would shame Ibiza. And yes, whatever happens at Burning Man stays at Burning Man.











